


We also want to publicize ALL "old" Frontier gatherings. Be sure to notify us with details: place, date, contact and so forth. They will be published in the "Timetable".

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Frontier's Acquisition of Central May Signal Regional Merger Splurge

CENTRAL MERGER MAY ONLY be first step for Frontier. "Certainly, we're not planning to stop with Central," said Frontier president and chairman Lewis W. Dymond in an interview with Air Travel about the pending merger agreement between Frontier and Central Airlines. Obviously pleased with the arrangement, Dymond believes the pact is likely to kick off a series of mergers within the industry that may ultimately reduce the current roster of 13 regionals to four or five.

"I wouldn't be surprised if you see a few other merger announcements within the next six months," he said, "and I'll bet the next one is between Allegheny and Lake Central." Dymond went on to suggest such other "probably combinations" as Pacific/Bonanza and Piedmont/Southern/Trans-Toxas. "In fact," he said, 'we're interested in talking with Trans-Texas as soon as possible."

Dymond's attitude seemed to reflect the Thinking which only recently sparked a series of merger moves among several Alaskan carriers and he's not alone among regional chiefs. About a week before the Frontier-Central announcement, Mohawk Airlines president Robert E. Peach told a Detroit security analyst group that such tie-ins as Mohawk and Continental or Mohawk and Western are not beyond the realm of possibility.

The Frontier-Central merger, now before the CAB, involves a \$17 million transaction of some 470,000 shares. The agreement was filed concurrently with a request by RKO General, Inc., Frontier's majority stockholder, to purchase 49 per cent of Central's stock, increasing RKO's holdings in Frontier as the surviving company and guaranteeing RKO's position as majority stockholder. RKO is fully owned by General Tire and Rubber Co. of Akron, Ohio

"Central has been up for sale for about four years and we had at least three discussions on merger before we reached our present agreement," Dymond noted. The most recent attempt to acquire Central was made last year when Ozark and Central worked out a merger agreement that was under consideration by the CAB when financing arrangements broke down. Ironically, one of the banks that withdrew financial support of the Ozark-Central pact—Chase Manhattan of New York—is involved in the current transaction. (A Frontier aide pointed out, also, that RKO simply "wrote its check" for the Central acquisition, paving the way for a smooth stock transition.)

The merger should strengthen Frontier's chances in its quest for long-haul routes to help support shorter, less economical runs. "We don't think the merger will hurt us a bit in the Pacific Northwest-Southwest case," Dymond. Frontier won long-sought Denver-St. Louis rights in that case and plans to start service on the new route June 13. The carrier had sought a run all the way to Seattle, but had to settle for the largest slice of the cake that went to a regional carrier. Its hopes for a Pacific Northwest entry were raised when the board left part of the case open for further consideration.

The merger will have little immediate impact on Frontier's subsidy requirements because of the extraordinary expenses that will arise during the transition period. However, the Frontier president was quick to add: "The ultimate effect will be to reduce the combined subsidy of both carriers, bringing us closer to the date when we can go off subsidy."

Denver-based Frontier currently flies to 64 cities in eleven western and southwestern states from border to border. Central, based in Fort Worth, operates in 46 cities within six southwestern states. The two carriers join at only five common cities—Denver, Kansas City, St. Louis, Colorado Springs and Pueblo, Colo. Frontier thus stands to pick up such key Central points as Dallas, Tulsa, Ft. Smith,

Ark., Wichita, and Oklahoma City. And that may only be the beginning, if the CAB acts favorably in two cases now pending, one of which would realign Central's routes, while the other would give the line a long-sought north-south entry into Chicago. Cities bounding the merged route system would include St. Louis and Omaha on the east, Dallas and Phoenix on the south, Salt Lake City on the west and some Montana and South Dakota communities on the north. Frontier is already the largest regional in terms of revenue passenger miles. A Frontier-Central combination, however, would outrank the domestic systems of several trunk carriers in unduplicated route miles.

While a management reorganization is likely to result from the absorption of Central, Dymond emphasized that Frontier's present staff will remain intact. However, a name change might be in store for the combined carriers. Frontier, in addition to Convair 580 propjets and DC-3s, operates three Boeing 727s, and will have two additional trijets operating by July. Although Central had planned to operate two leased DC-9s beginning in early 1968, the bulk of its fleet is made up of Dart Convair propjets and DC-3s. Dymond noted that Frontier is already looking at the DC-9 and Boeing 737 twinjets as probable additions to the fleet of the combined carriers.

Assured on the day of the interview by the CAB that it will give expeditious treatment to the merger proposal, the Frontier president noted that the Board's "ample employment protection provisions will be observed." At year-end 1966, Frontier had 1634 employees, while Central had 903 on its payroll.

"Frontier has experienced a steady growth pattern," he added, "and coupled with the recent long haul award in the Pacific Northwest-Southwest case, the merger with Central will be an important phase in an overall growth pattern."

Monarch recalled on Frontier's 30th.

On Nov. 27, 1976, Frontier will celebrate its 30th anniversary of flight operations. Today we are one of the largest of eight U.S. regional airlines. Operating 52 jet and propjet aircraft, we board over 3.7 million passengers a year. To understand our beginnings, however, we look back to that first flight of Monarch Airlines as seen through the eyes of retired Capt. A. Ray Harvey (written by Marilyn Haisten of Bedford, Texas) and his wife, Lois.

Excitement was running high in November, 1946.

Monarch Airlines, predecessor of Frontier Airlines, was waiting impatiently to receive an operating certificate from the FAA (then known as CAA) to operate a scheduled airline between Denver and Durango, Colorado.

Monarch's President, Ray "Papa" Wilson, had seven pilots on the payroll waiting for that piece of paper. Two of the men, Ray Harvey and Art Ashworth, were already qualified with ATRs and with over 5,000 hours; the two were type-rated in the DC-3, the prop Monarch would fly.

The pilots — Harvey, Ashworth, Bert Clark, John Myers, Willie Hurt, Swede Nettleblad and Don Bridie — found it "tough eating out every meal and staying in motels on a retainer fee of \$220 a month" while waiting for actual operations to begin, Harvey recalls.

During that interim, the men flew proving runs, prepared an operations manual, tackled mounds of paperwork and trained for the upcoming flights.

And they checked regularly with Washington on the status of that all-important certificate.

Finally, that day arrived. Beaming, Wilson called the men to his office, and he announced the first flight would be the next day, Nov. 27, 1946.

Just one problem arose on that planned Denver to Durango flight — Durango's airport was not yet open to airline operations. The first flight, then, was to be Stapleton Airport in Denver to Monte Vista, Colorado, a distance of 175 miles. Refusing discouragement, Harvey remembers that Ashworth snapped, "Hell, fill the tanks and let's get going."

On flight day, amid a gathering of family members and



IT WAS COLD the morning of Nov. 27, 1946, as my four-year-old daughter Karen and I watched the preparations for the departure of the first scheduled flight of Monarch Airlines. A great many hopes and dreams and years of planning were centered in the flight of that DC-3; the future of my little family rode with it. In contrast to all the security now, there was none then; I walked around the aircraft parked at the terminal taking pictures of Ray by the plane for our family album. I lived through those growing years and remember the growing pains. Many times I watched an incoming flight and wondered if the passengers would ever add up to the number of seats available. Ray has retired from flying now, but I never watch the departure of a Frontier flight without remembering that first flight thirty years ago. I am very proud of what I see.

friends armed with cameras to record the event, Ashworth as captain and Harvey as co-pilot waited while the mechanics ran through their paces.

With one paying passenger and two sacks of mail on board, Monarch was airborne.

The sleek uniforms of today's airline were missing on that first venture. Ashworth wore his Navy flight jacket; Harvey wore his Navy blue uniform with the stripes ripped off. But the spirit of the company's future — a merger in 1950 with Arizona Airways of Phoenix and Challenger Airlines of Salt Lake City — was with the Monarch crew. And those seven pilots, most of whom are now retired, stayed with the airline which took the name Frontier.

SHORT HISTORY OF THE 737

The 7500th 737 has been delivered to Malindo Airways. It was a -900 and Boeing has back orders for 3445 more 737s. The first 737, a -100, flew on April 9, 1967. LH was the launch customer and began sevice with it in February, 1968. UA launched the 737-200 in April, 1968. Boeing built 30 of the 737-100s and 1114 of the 737-200s - ending production in 1988. Thanks to hush-kits, some 150 JT8D-powered 737-200s remain in service. It took ten years to sell the first 500 737s. The first 737-300 flew on February 24, 1984.

Frontier Reunion: Airline Lives In Heart and Soul of Employees

Nearly 1,200 former Frontier Airlines employees, family members and friends laughed, cried and reminisced over the weekend, at the carrier's annual reunion at Elitch Gardens. A little rain (actually, a downpour) didn't dampen the spirits of those who came in from across the country to remember what was once the largest and most profitable regional airline in the country that continued to make history as a major carrier . . . and eventually succumbed to the pressures following airline deregulation.

The annual event is organized by Tom and Marge Hushka, who have kept a loosely-knit Frontier Employees Club going since it officially disbanded several years ago. For some participants, it is a chance to see old friends. Others run into co-workers out of touch since Frontier was closed by its parent company nearly six years ago. And for others, the reunion is still a part of the grieving and healing process.

"One person came up and said,
'It still hurts,'" recalled Marge
Hushka, in Frontier's
telecommunications department
for 17 years. "It does them
good."

Among those attending were

former president Hank Lund, and former vice presidents Chuck Demoney and Dan Hirsch. Lund is now a Denver-based consultant. Demoney is currently president of MGM Grand Air. Hirsch is a Denver investment broker.

However, rank and file employees made up the lion's share of participants.

"A lot of people had laughs, tears and lies," Tom Hushka said. The event was structured as a chance for people to get together. Other than a handful of memorabilia items to help offset costs, such as caps and beach towels, the Hushkas rejected every other effort by someone to sell or pitch Frontier mementos. They even turned down U.S. Sen. Tim Wirth, who wanted to speak about Frontier and his efforts to save the carrier. Frontier's demise was a major issue in Wirth's 1986 Senate campaign. Hushka, in Frontier's purchasing department for 19 years, told InnerLine the reunion was neither the time nor place for political speeches.

His wife told of Frontier reservation agents who came for the first time from Houston to this year's reunion.

"I asked if it's anything like they expected," she said. "'Marge, it's much much more," came the answer.

This article from the Jun 1992 Stapleton InnerLine newsletter graphically shows how our numbers are dwindling.

The reunion that year had 1200 FLolks in attendance. 185 attended this year.

Declining numbers are apparent at all the other FL reunions too.

If we stay the course, we can emulate many WWII veterans reunions, including my dad's 10th Armored Division, which did not stop until 60 years after the end of the war. See ya in 2046!:)

Norman Rosendale awarded Frontier's largest suggestion prize

What started for Norman Rosendale as a concern over safety some 17 months ago has resulted in a \$20,000 suggestion award - the largest in Frontier's history.

Rosendale developed a new system for Boeing 737 planeside weight and balance, which has resulted in improved loading accuracy, improved safety, and reduced fuel and manpower costs. After the new system has been implemented one year, Rosendale will likely receive an additional award, based on the first year's savings.

Suggestions submitted by employees are awarded prizes based on probable savings in labor and material, improvement in quality and working conditions, and originality. Dollar amounts equal approximately 10 percent of the first year savings resulting from the suggestion.

Before Rosendale developed his suggestion, Frontier's planeside weight and balance procedure called for material to be loaded first in the forward compartment of the 737 and then the rear. Rosendale reversed this system, designing a loading chart focusing on loading the rear compartment first and working to the front.


"My first step was to simplify the loading system - to clarify where the material was loaded. Under the previous system (forward first loading) there was larger room for error. At first my idea was sketchy, and the management at Denver station encouraged me to develop it further."

As Rosendale developed the suggestion, its potential impact on fuel and manpower savings became evident. Denver station implemented the program on a trial basis in May 1981, and expanded to full use in October 1981. Robert Thomas, senior agent in Des Moines, was awarded \$1,000 for assisting Rosendale in the initial development of the plan.

Rosendale - a five year Frontier station agent - holds a bachelor's degree in aerospace science from Metropolitan State College in Denver and hopes to work as a pilot. What's his next step?

In the Technical Services Division alone, there are hundreds of individual responsibilities that must be accomplished on a daily basis to provide the airline with timely and reliable aircraft to operate our schedules. Each and every person within our division is a vital part of the team.

This can be said of all divisions, departments and employees of the company. And yet, from too many fellow employees we continue to hear only criticism of other areas of responsibility. It should be a source of concern to all of us as members of the Frontier team that not everyone relies on and trusts that all team members are dedicated, equally professional and committed. When you combine the activities company wide that must be accomplished in order to produce one successful flight, the

importance of teamwork becomes abundantly clear.

A close look at profitable and successful firms reveals these companies are possessed of one main quality—namely, a highly professional group of employees who work together as a "team."

If our airline is going to become profitable and grow, we must improve our approach and our respect for all members of the team, knowing full well that each function is necessary and vital for a successful airline. How can this be done?

I'd like to make one suggestion—that in the coming year we reexamine our attitudes toward each other's areas of responsibility. Let's make a meaningful attempt to discuss with personnel involved the areas of concern with constructive recommendations for the betterment of Frontier Airlines.

We have the capability of being the largest and best regional service airline in the United States if we plan and work together for success. And remember, if we don't do it—it won't get done!
