I have not been happy with the newsletter lately. The need to fold it to get the lower postage rate bothered me most. It seemed like a People Express operation rather than a Frontier one.




I hope you like this new version as much as I do. The cover is heavier and printed on what my printer calls "chrome paper". The inside sheets are a bit heavier too. And it will

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INSIDE FLIGHT PROVISIONING

Imagine 1.1 million meals, 1.2 million cans of soft drinks, 1.4 million pieces of candy, 2 million packages of peanuts, over 500,000 bottles of liquor and 265,000 bags of ice. These and other food and beverage items were boarded on Frontier flights departing from Denver in 1980 by the flight provisioning department. 52 employees service some 120 departures a day.

A detailed plan is followed for each flight. 24 hours before departure, a preliminary passenger count is given to Sky Chefs (Frontier's catering service in Denver) if the flight offers meal or snack service. Non revenue passengers listed for the flight are included in this count.

Three hours before departure, a final count is given to Sky Chefs. Using this count, meal preparations are completed, and meals are loaded on Frontier catering trucks at the Sky Chefs facility across the ramp from the D concourse. Earlier, trucks are stocked with beverage and packaged food items stored in the flight provisioning area below the D concourse.

30 to 40 minutes before departure, the catering truck pulls up to the plane. All food and beverage items from the previous flight are unloaded, and new meals and beverages are loaded. This is completed by one provisioning agent in 25 to 30 minutes.

This procedure challenges the staff to work with many departments, including dining services, Sky Chefs, flight attendants, ramp agents, gate agents, maintenance and reservations personnel.

Flight provisioning in Denver affects other cities on Frontier's system. A departure for Dallas/Fort Worth and Shreveport may include beverages for the DFW-SHV segment. At Dallas/Fort Worth, station agents will replenish beverage carts as needed.

Or, provisioning may board meals out of Denver for a return trip later that day. A Denver-Salt Lake City flight may not include meal service, but meals may be boarded in Denver for a later Salt Lake City-Denver segment, to save costs and manpower.

A major emphasis of the provisioning staff is to control costs through "meal banking." After a final passenger count is given to Sky Chefs, some three hours before departure, additional passengers often book reservations. Extra meals are stored at the station in case the actual passenger count exceeds the number of meals provided, due to late reservations. Up to departure time, provisioning agents are aboard planes boarding extra meals for late passengers.

If the passenger count is below the number of meals provided, provisioning agents will remove meals from the flight. These meals are returned to the "food bank" for use on a later flight. Meals are refrigerated at the station, closely following health department rules. Meal shortages, including food service for non revenue passengers, average 1 percent.

Food banks also include special meals requested by passengers, such as kosher or vegetarian meals. Passengers make such requests when booking reservations.

If all this isn't enough to keep the staff busy, there is always monitoring the liquor; ordering beverage and packaged food items weekly: handling linen napkins used throughout the system; or tracking the inventory.

After all, flights leaving Denver last year used 267,000 cans of coffee, 615,000 packages of cream and 900,000 packages of sugar. -Apr 1981 Frontier News

FLYING THE CV 580

The flight controls were all manual / mechanical, no hydraulic assist. Some Convairs had autopilots when Frontier bought them. I was told the autopilots were all removed, and I never saw an autopilot in any Frontier Convair 580. We "hand-flew" it from takeoff to touchdown... and roll-out. <G> In strong gusty crosswinds it could be a handful, as in "BOTH pilots" working at it. The Convair was a pressurized airplane, and as such, it was "air conditioned", including the cockpit. Captains would crank their sliding-glass-side-window back to adjust airflow / pressurization on the ground. I remember WELL, how I would sit in the copilot seat, running the engines to pre-heat the cabin before the passengers arrived in the winter at "out-stations" in Wyoming for the first flight-leg of the day. I loved the "beast". It sure "made you a pilot".



Some years back I was doing some research in the archive book section of Brigham Young University. In reading about the old airmail pilots who flew the transcontinental mail between the years of 1918 and 1927, I came across an article explaining the term "Gone West."

As the old airmail route continued its expansion from the east coast to the west, thirty-two pilots and nine mechanics lost their lives in the line of duty. Three hundred wrecked aircraft were strewn from the Allegheny Mountains known as "The Hell Stretch," across the open plains to the Rockies, the Wasatch, the Sierras into the west coast. When a pilot was over due, the term "Gone West" came into being.

NOTES FROM FLOLKS

I REMEMBER

Long before my 10-year stint as a newspaper sports reporter and long before my six years of service as an employee for the state of Arizona, I worked for the best regional airline in the world -- the old Frontier Airlines.

The airline passed away in 1986.

I was 41 at the time. I had spent 20 years with the company and worked in different parts of the country, including Omaha, Nebraska; Sacramento, California as well as Tucson and Phoenix.

I was the guy at the gates -- running around with my head cut off. You'd find me at the departure and arrival gates, the ticket counter, on the ramp, or pulling the Jetway back. Believe it or not, I worked at a fast pace and handled stressful situations -- forced at times to think quickly and come up with a solution to a problem that at first glance seemed impossible to solve.

I pulled drunks off the airplane, handled oversold flights on Thanksgiving, dealt with irate customers, bad weather...well you name it, I did it.

I miss the airline business from time to time. I miss my teammates, as I like to call them...my fellow employees who all did what they had to do, on a daily basis, to get the job done. We were a family, over 4,000 dedicated people with one goal in mind: to be the best airline in the business. And, we were!

The airline business of today is a far cry from the "good old days" when Frontier roamed the skies.

Oh, we had our moments...mistakes were made. A lot of craziness went on.

I remember a time when I first started. I was what they called a "ramp rat" -- loading bags on a 737 in Tucson, Arizona. It was a windy day. You know, one of those days when the wind blew 50 miles an hour and dust rolled across town, heading for the Midwest and looking to turn into a tornado or a powerful rainstorm along the way.

Luckily, in Tucson we are forced to deal with dust...and not much else. At any rate, the plane arrived and we proceeded to unload 200 bags out of the rear pit. Down the belt they came, one after another. Well, one of the bags -- a wig case, decided to take flight. The case fell off the belt, bounced on the hard cement, broke open...and the wig took off -- heading for the runway.

I jumped on the tug and gave chase. I caught up with the wig at the south end of the runway, but by that time the wig had picked up every cacti or pebble it could find along the way.

I returned to the ramp, cleaned the wig up the best I could, and stuck it back in the case.

As far as I know, there was never a claim made on the "elusive" wig.

One thing I was sure of at the time: The wig was faster than a jackrabbit.

The stories are endless. The job certainly had its moments.

I remember a crazy day in Phoenix. All our flights were running late -- due mainly to the weather in Denver, Colorado. That of course, made it tough on the customers -- especially the ones that had connections to Los Angeles.

Well to make a long story short, it was my job to get an "important person" off our plane, on to the tug, and run the person across the ramp to connect with his LA flight.

There was just moments to spare. I quickly took the customer's carry-on bag and had the gentleman sit next to me as we sped off. The engines were roaring by the time I reached the Continental operations area. The ladder was still nestled around the front entrance to the plane and the flight attendant at the top of the stairs was waiting, patiently.

The gentleman looked back at me as he boarded the aircraft. "Thanks, Sonny," he said with a smile.

It was my favorite actor, Kirk Douglas.

Working for the old Frontier Airlines was fun and a privilege. Believe it or not, we had steak and eggs on our breakfast flights. Good luck on finding a bag of peanuts these days.

Twenty-eight years ago. I still miss those times...and miss my Frontier teammates.

I was in the FAL crew room at the old Stapleton Airport in 1967. Back then, we were at the base of the old tower on the "A" concourse.

Our senior captain, Art Ashworth, came in and picked up the direct line phone to crew scheduling. Ellie Bastar answered.

Art said: "Cover my trip Ellie, I'm sick." Ellie liked to play doctor. "What's wrong with you Art?" Art: "It's my ears, Ellie." Ellie: "What's wrong with your ears, Art?" Art: "I can't piss thru 'em!"...and then he hung up. Sure wish we could have seen Ellie's reaction...

Sadly, she was hit and killed near Buckley Air Base when she was out for a jog. A hit and run...

(Ellie flew west on Oct 14, 1987, age 63. She started as a flight attendant in 1948 then worked as a crew scheduler until the bankruptcy. Art's flight west preceded her on Mar 17, 1977, age 64. Art was #1 on the FL pilot seniority list for 27 years - 1946 to 1973 - his entire career.)

That reminds me of the grievance board on which I put two ladies from DEN reservations. The first case was a station agent fired for abusing sick leave. Testimony revealed he told the company he had a vasectomy but the company said he never brought a doctor's certificate. Things started getting tense as the company said they doubted he had the procedure and the agent started getting angry.

He was about 6 foot 6 and suddenly he stood up and started unbuckling his pants. "By God, I'll show you!" he shouted. Pandmonium broke loose as the ALEA lawyer tried to stop the agent and the company representative was yelling, "No, No, we'll stipulate, we'll stipulate you had it." The eyes of the two ladies from reservations were big as pie pans and both looked like they were about to topple over backwards in their chairs.

Afterwards, they asked, "My God, is it always this exciting at the system boards?"

Later still, the arbitrator, unimpressed with the theatrics, upheld the termination.

I REMEMBER TOO

The day Frontier Airlines shut down, I was in Long Beach instructing in the simulator. I got a call from Red, saying we are shutdown down, and to just come home on the next flight; there was only one. Many flights were stranded; some of the crews had to find their own way home on other carriers.

We hurriedly packed our bag in confusion. When we got to DEN, we were told to get to the office to get our last check as soon as possible; we might not get it in bankruptcy. I did and went directly to the credit union to cash it and withdraw my savings. Later I was told that some, who did not do this, lost their money. We all went to the union meeting the next day;

where we were told all about what had happened; what would be the next step?

It sounded like it would be permanent so "start looking for other work". Several of our leaders said they would do what they could to help. We all started in shock applying. I got a job in the UAL training department where, we were under contract and with NO benefits and no guarantee of the hours, we would we would be paid for. It was a job but not much more. I went through DC-8 engineer school, and got my engineering rating, just barely, as the next day we were hired by Continental. I got the rating the night before.

Billy Walker, our MEC, told us, they were working on mergers with UAL and Continental. UAL was buying our 737's, so there was a, chance they would take us with full seniority. We were reveling in our new found better jobs. I was in the Virgin Islands; we celebrated. Their union got in the act and voted against the date of hire seniority. They would accept us ONLY IF we were all tacked on the bottom otherwise NO even though, we were in the same union. This practice was usually successful, but not this time.

The reason we were shut down was that Peoples Express had bought us the prior year. They had taken all our equipment to shore up their balance sheet. They were broke too, but they were still operating, unlike us who were shut down. Continental had been on strike, and busted the unions. They were taking the pilots, known as the crawl backs, to put them to work at a greatly reduced pay and flight schedule, and with very reduced benefits. This would become our fate when, we were finally merged into Continental.

Two months after our shut down, Billy Walker and the rest of the negotiators signed an agreement to merge. It was NOT a good deal, but better than nothing. We were to get half pay and double the work. In the process Frank Lorenzo, who owned Continental at the time, stole \$8 million of our retirement fund. All of our sick leave pay was lost.

The smart pilots went to other companies such as UPS and Flying Tigers. Some went there; others went to US Air and Northwest (I was not because, I was too old; I should have sued.). All of them came out much better than those of us who stayed at Continental. Our pilots were scattered all over the world. Some went to the non scheds; others NOT!

Continental did not take the mechanics or the ground crew. The flight attendants were taken back with FULL seniority, thanks to their strong MEC. Peoples Express and New York Air were merged date of hire. We, because we were shut down, were "given" a greatly reduced seniority. For example I had 20 years with Frontier but, only got three with the new merged list. A friend near the top of our list got 30 YEARS, and also only got THREE YEARS. The bottom pilots did fairly well as Continental was hiring a lot of new pilots who would go behind the Frontier pilots.

After flying our own equipment for two years under Continental colors we were now going to fly all of Continental and Frontier planes. Continental had so many different aircraft that it was difficult to know new procedures and types of aircraft. It was a dangerous situation.

In one case all the switches were backwards from the others. To make matters worse, after a certain date, they were to close most of the bases. Instead of commuting, I chose to fly copilot. I did that for two years,





THE LOVE OF FLYING

By Frontier pilot Bob Williams

Part 2, continued from page 27 of the Spring 2014 issue.

At nineteen, the minimum FAA age limit, I passed my instructor rating and finally someone was willing to pay me to teach them to fly. I free-lanced as an instructor while I was going to college, but the lure was too great, so I quit school after one year at Westminster College so I could devote all of my time to flying.

OFF TO THE WILD BLUE YONDER

My first flying job (starting May 1st, 1960) was as an instructor for Hank Coffin, owner of Coffin Air Service, located at Whiteman Field in Pacoima, CA. (North of Burbank airport in the San Fernando Valley) I earned \$5.00 for each hour that I instructed with no guarantees. My friend, Earle Morris joined me in the Los Angeles area and was instructing also. I didn't make much money, but I got to rub shoulder with some of the "Hollywood" crowd. One of my students was the actor and WWII hero, Audie Murphy. He owned a horse ranch in Paris, CA, so we would fly down to his ranch and land on a dirt strip and spend the day with his horses. I also met Greg "Pappy" Boyington famous for his flying with the Flying Tigers in China and then the leader of the "Black Sheep Squadron" in the South Pacific during WWII.

After about 6 months of instructing my boss told me of a co-pilots job on a DC-2 and DC-3 out of Burbank airport and wanted to know if I was interested. Within a week I was flying for Mercer Enterprises flying charters around the Western states. My first flight was co-pilot on a DC-2 flying to San Diego, CA and back. I found out that there were only two DC-2's left flying and this was one of them. Occasionally, I would freelance as a co-pilot on a C-46 for a company called California Airfreight.

They would fly 5 nights a week up to San Francisco and then we would load bags full, until the airplane was completely filled, of the Wall Street Journals to get back to Burbank before 5 am to reach the market. It was on one of these flights to San Francisco that a pilot from another airline "bummed" a ride on our jumpseat. He worked for a new charter airline based in Europe and was going to pick up a one of their DC-4's in Oakland, CA.

On the way he asked me if I would be interested in coming to work for his new airline and live in Europe. He just happened to have an application with him, so I filled it out and told him I was interested and bid him farewell at the San Francisco airport, convinced that I wouldn't hear from him again.

Well two weeks later I got a telegram from Seven Seas Airlines, based in Luxembourg, Europe telling me that I was hired as a co-pilot on a C-46 and there would be a ticket waiting for me in New York City to get me to Luxembourg. So I sold my car, packed up all my belongings and in January 1961, at the ripe old age of 21, I flew off to New York City and on to Europe on a wonderful adventure.

EUROPE AND AFRICAN ADVENTURE.

After arriving in Luxembourg and after getting settled I was informed that I would be going to the Belgian Congo to fly on the C-46 and DC-4 for the United Nations (Organization Nations United) out of Leopoldville in the Congo. So in February 1961 I rode in the back of one of our DC-4's heading for the Congo. We made fueling stops in Algiers and Kano, Nigeria before

arriving at Leopoldville. (Later named Kinshasa)

The next day I took my check-ride on the DC-4 with Captain Syd Wheatley and after 3 takeoffs and landings I was now qualified. I made several "ferry" flights to our maintenance base in Brazzaville, which was a short flight, of 30 minutes, over the Congo River. On March 4th, 1961 I was assigned as co-pilot on a DC-4 trip back to Luxembourg. My Captain was Dick Tracy and we made fuel stops at Fort Lamy, Chad (now N'Djamena) and Tripoli, Libya. After a few days back in civilization the company paid for me to fly on KLM "Royal Dutch Airlines" back to the Congo, but this time to Elizabethville. My flight started in Amsterdam, Holland on March 13th and then to Frankfurt, Germany, Rome, Italy, Kano, Nigeria and then on to Brazzaville. I changed airlines and rode on a UTA (a French airline) DC-6 on to Elizabethville in the Congo.

Two days later on March 15th I flew my first C-46 trip with Captain Chuck Naylor to a town called Bakwanga, in the Congo. Our company (Seven Seas Airlines) was no longer under contract with the United Nations and now we were flying for the Government of Katanga, which was a providence that was trying to succeed from the Belgian Congo. We were hauling mostly freight that supported the army financed by the government of Katanga.

While I was flying in the Congo I learned about how lucky I was to have been raised in the western world with all the comforts that I had. On one flight into a town called Kongolo, which is on the Congo river about 3 hours north of Elizabethville, I watched a native prisoner get beaten to death with rifle-buts, for trying to steal a bar of lye soap. We flew into the same airport almost everyday and each time the native soldiers would surround our aircraft and then about 10 "friendly" soldiers would point their sub-machine guns at us in the cockpit. Then they would wait until a white, mercenary officer would get onboard and see that we didn't have any of their enemies on board.

There were three Roman Catholic monks that lived in Kongolo and worked with the locals. They would ask us to buy things for them in Elizabethville and bring them to them, because they could not get supplies up the river for weeks. After several weeks we noticed that the monks weren't anywhere to be seen. I asked the mercenary where they were and he told me the natives got drunk and killed the monks and threw their bodies to the crocodiles in the river.

We flew into another city called Manono. It was where the copper mines were and was considered an important asset to the Katanga government. We never knew who was in control of the town, so our procedure was to fly over the field and look for two orange cloth panels that were put out by the friendly troops. If we saw the orange panels we would land, but if we did not, we would turn around and return to Elizabethville. Even after we landed we wouldn't shut down the engines until a certain white officer would come out and wave to us. My first time in there we had just shut down the engines and I slid my window open and I immediately heard machine gun fire in the jungle along side the runway. I was so anxious to get out of there I went back and helped the natives unload the cargo and gave myself a hernia on my left side.

On another trip we were getting ready to depart Elizabethville, before sunrise, and as we were starting to taxi when a black car pulled in front of the airplane. A Belgian government official 25

jumped onboard and told us that that night they had learned that there was going to be an attack on the Elizabethville airport. So he instructed us that when we returned from our flight we were to tell the tower that we were experiencing mechanical problems and continue on to N'Dola, in Northern Rhodesia. (Now the country of Zambia) Sure enough we did what we were told and as forecasted the fighters shelled the airport. We spent 4 days in N'Dola until things settled down and returned to Elizabethville.

After this our company decided it was time to pull out of this "war" and head back to Europe. Arrangements were made for a few of us to hitch a ride on a Royal Canadian Air Force "Nor-Star" and they dropped us off in Pisa, Italy. We hopped on the next train headed for Luxembourg and back into a more civilized world.

It wasn't until the war had died and then because of our support we were granted authority to fly a weekly scheduled passenger trip from Luxembourg to Elizabethville in Katanga providence.

So on June 13th, 1961 I flew as a copilot for Captain Ed Reimers, on our first scheduled trip to the Congo. We made fuel stops in Tripoli, Libya, Brazzaville and then to Elizabethville. Spent 48 hours and then returned back the same way to Luxembourg.

THE HAJJ PILGRIMAGE

If you are of the Muslim faith then it is part of your belief that you need to go on a pilgrimage, at least once in your lifetime, to Mecca, Saudi Arabia, where the grave of Mohammed is located. This pilgrimage is called, "The Hajj." My company was awarded the contract to fly followers from Tehran, Iran to Jeddah, Saudi Arabia, so on May 7th, 1961 I took off, as First Officer on one of our DC-4's headed for Tehran. We made one fueling stop in Istanbul, Turkey and after 14 hours we arrived in Tehran and into a completely different world.

It was like stepping back in time into a world where the customs and lifestyle are so different than my western upbringing. Most of our passengers were very poor peasants who had only seen an airplane as it flew over, let alone ride on one. We had contracted with a local airline (Iran Air) to provide stewardesses that spoke the language and knew the customs. On each flight the aisle in the airplane was filled, from front to back, with faithful Muslims, facing toward Mecca, offering their required prayers.

The only way the crew could get to the restroom was to step from one seat to another, so as not to disturb their prayers. This considerably slowed me down, with the fire extinguisher, when one elderly man had started a fire in the metal wash basin, so he could cook his meal while enroute. Another elderly man had a bowel movement on the floor in front of his seat and then tore the curtain from the window to wipe himself. Like I said, this was a different world.

It was on one of these trips that I got food poisoning and spent three days in the hotel unable to move. The hotel called an English-speaking doctor from the British embassy to come and care for me, but he said most of it had already passed, or come up, so he gave me some pills to help the diarrhea. I lost about 10 lbs. in three days and so the company paid for me to ride back to Luxembourg on Lufthansa Airlines. We made stops in Baghdad, Iraq and Beirut, Lebanon and then Frankfurt, Germany. I caught a train from there back home to Luxembourg.

OVER THE NORTH ATLANTIC

After a few weeks of rest I was assigned a trip to New York City on a charter for the Pulaski Foundation to fly some of their group to Warsaw, Poland. We took off from Luxembourg with Captain Dick Tracy and reserve Capt. Don Warton and myself as First officer. We made fueling stops in Preswick, Scotland, Keflavick, Iceland, Goose Bay, Labrador and then on to New York

This trip was the one we almost ran out of gas over the North Atlantic. We took off from Iceland, over grossed in weight because there were strong headwinds and we added more fuel, so we could make Gander, Newfoundland. Problem was the winds were stronger and the aircraft couldn't make normal speed, due to our extra weight. Fortunately, we had the best navigator I had ever met, (Gus Gustine) he was an Australian. About 5 hours into the flight, about half way, he came up to us in to cockpit and told us the bad news. Based on his calculation we were going to run out of fuel about 30 minutes short of the airport at Gander.

Well after considering all the possibilities, Captain Tracy made the decision to divert and try to make it to Goose Bay in Labrador. I checked the weather with Oceanic Control and even though it was snowing we committed ourselves and headed for Goose Bay. After almost 10 hours of flying we contacted Goose Bay approach control and were informed that the airport was below landing minimums due to a snow storm. We informed them that we were almost out of fuel and declared an emergency and requested an immediate approach to landing. We opened up all the fuel crossfeeds, so any tank that had fuel would supply any engine and we started the approach. When we got down to where we were suppose to see the runway the approach controller told us to go around, but the Captain kept descending until at the last minute we found the snow covered runway. Had we gone around we would have run out of fuel, before we could have made another approach.

The problems continued because we were charged \$733.00 for a landing fee and the 71 passengers hadn't been fed for over 10 hours, so we chartered a bus to take them to a nearby hotel for breakfast. The Captain brought the whole crew together and asked if we had any cash that we could donate until we got to New York, because he didn't have enough money in his Captain fund and we had no credit cards. We pooled all our money, I donated two hundred in traveler's checks, and with all our collective money we were able to cover expenses and takeoff for New York.

I was assigned to fly the next leg, while the two Captains rested up for the arrival in New York's "Idlewild" (now Kennedy) airport. It was a 7 hrs. and 20 min flight and all was going well, but then I noticed that I could not hear any radio contact from air traffic control. After trying to trouble shoot the problem I finally had the Captain woken and I informed him of our problem. We had lost all our radio communications with the ground. After trying several different methods we finally were able to transmit on one frequency and listen on another. By the time we finally got this working we were well inside New York's busy traffic area.

Because we were in the clouds the Captain knew we could be in the clear if we climbed another thousand feet, so without clearance he decided to climb and turn away from the busy traffic area. (To be continued in the next issue.)

From page 20 when I could not stand flying with captains who had much less experience than me.

That was major bad as most Frontier pilots were based in Denver and now had to start commuting. Several of our pilots were so shaken by this state of affairs, that they committed suicide. There were many divorces.

When things did break the top half were stuck; the bottom half advanced quickly and were captains in short order. Continental, because they wanted to grow back to their original "glory", quickly merged with several other commuter carriers. It was a total disaster, as we tried to work together. There were different procedures; we all hated each other for what we got or didn't get. Most of the groups would not even talk to each other, sometimes even in the cockpit, NOT a very safe situation.

The flight attendants, because they got their full seniority, could not understand why we were bitter. There was a master seniority list, which was used to keep track of the "crawl backs, the FAL, NYA, Peoples Express, on and on, some of which were considered to be scabs. The scabs were especially persecuted. Some of the groups were also considered to be scabs, as well. What a total mess we had, when it could have been so simple, if we would have been placed "date of hire".

So much for the loss of our beloved Frontier Airlines. Our lives would be changed forever - some for the good, most for the bad. But you know we all survived and are stronger for it. God works in mysterious ways. We thank him for taking care of us.
