has made a career out of retiring. He did it first in 1951, quitting as senior vice president and director of the Valley National Bank, but retaining civic posts as chairman of and trustee of St. Luke's Hospital. But Taylor went back to work and retired again. This time he left the presidency of Union Guaranty Co., a move giving him more hours to devote to chairmanship of the Arizona State Retirement Board.

In January, Taylor turned his retirement into a triple play by stepping aside after 30 years of near-constant service as treasurer and board member of Arizona. Blue Cross. He's now 80 years into his prime. Which is no age for a young man to be thinking of leaving his remaining job as one of Arizona's most erudite bankruptcy referees.
