Once I thought about it, the choice was easy - Bonnie Dahl. She was #12 on the last FL/AFA Seniority list with a start date of 8/2/62. When Frontier died Bonnie had been flying for 24 years. Then she flew another 22 years with Continental Airlines, finally retiring in Aug 2008 with 46 years of flying.

Bonnie has been a major supporter of the Frontier News almost from the start and her involvement has increased since she retired. She is my go to person now for information on flight attendants and pilots. Billy Walker and Phil Stallings are a big help with pilots too. She often re-orders copies of the newsletter since she has given hers away to some Frontier person who didn't have one. 
We also want to publicize ALL "old" Frontier gatherings. Be sure to notify us with details: place, date, contact and so forth. They will be published in the "Timetable".

She and fellow flight attendant Patty O'Neill published a wonderful book of photographs of the Frontier flight crews and she has given me permission to use any of them for FLolks who have flown west.

Bonnie has also developed and sells a line of notecards with a flight attendant motif.

To give you an idea of how she has helped over the years, here are my notes about a phone call from her.

"Bonnie Dahl phoned me at 10:30 am, May 4, 2005. She wanted to buy a 2 year subscription for another FL FA - Sharon Theriot who took the 1985 early out with Frontier.

We chatted awhile and Bonnie is based out of EWR flying international routes along with some other high seniority FL FAs.

Ellen Quinn is #2 on CO seniority and Kathy Hines is #3 (both are 68 years old now) while Bonnie is #11.

The FL FAs collected money to hire a lawyer to get their FL seniority at CO. The FAs did not sign the "job preservation" agreement so that left the door open for them. However, they did not get seniority for pay purposes.

Bonnie flew the London route for several years, then the Paris run and now she's been on the Tokyo run in Boeing 777s for about 5 years.

She commutes from DEN to EWR and hasn't called in sick in 13 years.

Bonnie is from Montana and started in BIL in 1962 flying DC-3s.

Her brother John is the station manager for UA in TPA and is doing well but has had to take some pay cuts

because of UA's problems. He was a DEN tower manager at Frontier.

She estimates there are about 100 old FL FAs at CO now and all have lots of seniority. They call them the "prairie girls".

CO starts flying to Beijing, China in June and she may start flying that route"

So, hats off and three shouts hurrah for the Fabulous Frontier Flight Attendants. They always did us proud! I lost count of the times I boarded a flight and gave a sigh of relief to get rid of those people. Then I would pity the poor flight attendants stuck with them the next few hours.



Some years back I was doing some research in the archive book section of Brigham Young University. In reading about the old airmail pilots who flew the transcontinental mail between the years of 1918 and 1927, I came across an article explaining the term "Gone West."

As the old airmail route continued its expansion from the east coast to the west, thirty-two pilots and nine mechanics lost their lives in the line of duty. Three hundred wrecked aircraft were strewn from the Allegheny Mountains known as "The Hell Stretch," across the open plains to the Rockies, the Wasatch, the Sierras into the west coast. When a pilot was over due, the term "Gone West" came into being.


BILL MONDAY 1947 - 1985 DIRECTOR RESERVATION PLANNING DEN

OBITUARY: William Robert Monday was born May 25, 1925, in Long Beach, California, to William Alonzo Monday and Mabel Frazier Monday.

In 1947 Challenger Airlines (which later became Frontier Airlines) hired him as its station agent for Billings, Montana. He subsequently worked for them in Farmington, New Mexico, and Worland, Wyoming. In Worland he met Carolina "Dimmie" Pendergraft and they were married in 1952. He and Carolina reared their family of seven children in the Denver area from the 1950s through the 1970s. They were later divorced.

Monday spent his entire career at Frontier Airlines. He was a self-made businessman, applying his characteristic intelligence, determination, and common sense to achieve efficiency in the many tasks assigned to him. During the 1960s he took night classes in computer operations to stay abreast of the new technology for managing business data and also attended Dale Carnegie classes in human relations. He was the manager of Frontier's reservations department for many years. Later he became Director of Computer Services and later still Director of Customer Services, a division of about 1000 personnel that encompassed reservations, flight attendants, dining services,



and lost and found. After 38 years of service, Monday retired from Frontier Airlines in 1985.

In December 1976 Monday married Barbara G. Smith of Denver, Colorado. They honeymooned on Maui and thus began a joyous 37-year partnership.





Lisa Davis, reservations agent, won \$25 for suggesting queue operations; Karlina White, reservations agent, \$25 for a phone directory for agency phone numbers; Sandra Force, reservations agent. \$17.50 for availability of interairline phone numbers; and Gerald Anderson, aircraft technician, \$12.50 for fuel valve circuit modification.

Frontier strengthens competitive position.

Frontier has reorganized the marketing division, structuring it to strengthen the company's competitive position in the market-place and to exploit the opportunities of the new deregulated airline environment.

The new division of Market Planning and reorganized Sales and Service division are designed to enhance the efficiency and effectiveness of Frontier's marketing efforts.

"This is a positive step for Frontier," says Gordon Linkon, vice president-marketing. "We are working from a solid base. These revisions were carefully thought out to make certain they are correct for Frontier."

Market Planning centralizes the functions of pricing, scheduling, economic planning, and market research and analysis.

According to Chuck Demoney, the new vice president-market planning, the centralized scheduling and pricing functions respond to market flexibility and system growth. Input from the field continues to be instrumental in decision rnaing, while centralized planning provides sysyem-wide consistency.

Market research and analysis provides forecasts from which commitments to system revenue are made. Changes in revenue are projected as changes are made in scheduling and pricing. Economic planning's primary responsibility is guiding the strategic growth of the airline, name routes.

Sales and Service headed by Vice President Hank Lund, includes a strategic planning group consisting of Directors of Field Marketing-Western, Field Marketing-Eastern, Leisure Marketing, and Advertising and Sales Promotion.

Other key personnel include Administration and Local Services, Consumer Services, Consumer Affairs, Cargo Sales and Service, Commuter Marketing, Convention Sales, and Industry and Interline Affairs.

The centralized Sales and Service force draws upon talent in the field and in headquarters while maintaining sales support and service to travel agents, other key accounts, and general customers, according to Lund.

The City Manager position, reporting directly to Field Marketing Divisions, replaces those now titled Manager Transportation Services and Sales Service Manager. Organizations headed by City Managers serve travel agents, key accounts, general customers.

"The City Manager is a new and significant role in our future success," Lund says. "Managers will provide input for revenue commitments and are committed to budget, performance and production standard maintenance."

Three exceptions to this program are Denver, Salt Lake City and Las Vegas. Current titles are being retained at both station and sales offices.

Marketing executives are enthusiastic about the new Market Planning division and reorganized Saies and Service division.

"Frontier's new marketing structure will enable us to be aggressive, to move more quickly, and will enhance our ability to make smart decisions so we will be ahead of the competition." Linkon says.

FRONTIER AND THE 737-200

There was a time in the 1970s when Frontier Airlines was one of the most significant operators of the Boeing 737 and it was on the dependable 737-200 that the airline rose to prominence to challenge the established major carriers of the day. To go from humble beginnings flying second-hand Douglas DC-3s to having the second largest route network in the United States when the first 737-200s arrived at the airline is a story that for the most part has remained hidden to history, overshadowed by the storied legacies of larger airlines like American, Delta, or United.

Frontier's first jets were actually 727-100s styled as "Arrow Jets" which first entered service with Frontier in 1966, becoming the first local service carrier to fly the 727. Route expansions (aided by the acquisition of Fort Worth-based Central Airlines in 1967) and further route authorities granted by the Civil Aeronautics Board brought about the move in 1968 to larger 727-200s. Only a year later in 1969 Lewis Dymond, president of Frontier, retired- at the helm of the airline since 1962, Dymond did much to restore the airline to profitability through the latter half of 1960s that allowed the acquisition of jet equipment. Replacing Dymond was E. Paul Burke. Burke only served at the helm of the airline for a short two years, but his legacy to the airline was his realization in 1969 that the 737-200 was far more suited to Frontier's network than the 727s. The first five 737-200s were ordered as one of his first acts as president of the airline and the 727-100s were traded in to Boeing as part of the payment or the first 737s.

The 737-200s could serve even smaller airports than the larger 727s and this allowed Frontier a more flexible aircraft for its route network- the new jets were at home flying to smaller cities like Scottsbluff, Nebraska or Grand Junction, Colorado just as easily as larger cities like Dallas or Denver. By the time the first 737-200s were delivered, in terms of cities served, Frontier had the second-largest route network in the United States.

The first 737-191s arrived in April 1969 and by 1970 had 10 737-200s on strength with the airline. By the time of Burke's departure from the executive suite in 1971, the 727s were being phased out, with the last of the 727-191s sold in 1972 and as well as the sale of the larger 727-291s to Braniff International. Succeeding Burke would be Frontier's greatest president, Al Feldman. Under Feldman's tenure from 1971 to 1979, Frontier standardized its jet equipment on the 737-200 and entered a period of impressive expansion, profitability and rise to prominence as one of the largest regional carriers in the United States. By the time of the introduction of the final Saul Bass colors in April 1978, Frontier had 32 737-200s on strength with 10 more on order. Frontier's western route network stretched into both Canada and Mexico, from California and Washington in the West to as far east as Michigan and Georgia. Denver Stapleton became one of the few three-airline major hubs of its day, with Frontier ably holding itsown against incumbents Continental and United. Undoubtedly it was the flexible operating economics of the 737-200 that allowed Frontier to weather the economic turmoil that hit the industry in the early 1970s.

One item of interest was the introduction of first-class legroom in coach class on Frontier's 737-200s. The aircraft were configured for 106 passengers in a single-class layout and it proved to be immensely popular with passengers. It was just one of the many changes Al Feldman implemented in Frontier's service

image that formed the foundation for its impressively profitable growth during the turbulent 1970s.

Just to think that there was a time in the 1970s when Frontier flew their 737s into cities in Colorado like Durango and Grand Junction and cities in Nebraska like Scottsbluff and Grand Island-cities that today rate only small regional prop service if at all! A lot of Frontier's 737 destinations in those days today have only small regional prop service. Quite a change from just 30 years ago for these communities!

JAKE'S STORY

Chuck Levine, Dave Poppers and I were wondering about your career and hoping you send a biography of yourself? Thanks for your great news letter.

OK, Ernie et al, here goes. My earliest memory was going on a date with my dad and going home with my mom. I was born on Sep 26, 1942 and immediately embraced the family motto, "Don't tell me what to do!" Later that day Dad got his draft notice and spent most of the next three years on European holiday with Georgie Patton.

My family was a rolling stone and I went to about 21 different schools but finally graduated from Memphis Tech in May 1960. Later that year I went to Chicago to work as a lab technician but got so cold I joined the Air Force in Feb 1961 to enjoy some Texas sunshine. By summer I was in Hawaii and spent three years chasing cargo and airplanes all over the Pacific. I was involved in the Cuban Missle Crisis, the last U. S. atmospheric nuclear tests, managed to pick up some courses at the U. of Hawaii and had a constant battle with the Air Force bureaucracy. We parted ways in Jul 1964 with audible sighs of relief from both sides.

A month later, Aug 26, 1964, I started work at Central Airlines in FYV as a passenger service agent then became a station agent when Frontier bought us in Oct 1967. I transferred to STL in Jul 1968 and became a senior station agent. Then I was off to JAC the summers of 1970-71-72 where I was a senior. After a short stay at LAW I was back in FYV where I stayed until we closed Jan 31, 1982. After that it was ATL, SAN, MAF then DEN.

In 1971 I got involved with our union, Air Line Employees Assn (ALEA) and held offices of one kind or another for the next 15 years. I served as ALEA Master Chairman 1980-84, Chairman of the System Board 1984-86 and was ALEA International Vice President in 1986.

After the death of Frontier I returned to my home in FYV which I had luckily been unable to sell for several years. I lived off my savings and the sale of assets for the next two years, got married and fathered a wonderful daughter, JJ, which is short for Jake Jr. - she was supposed to be a boy.

Oct 1988 I came out of "semi-retirement" to work for the FYV post office. My career with Frontier had exposed me to every possible kind of human behavior and I was certain I had seen everything. The post office, beginning the first night at work, quickly proved how wrong I was. Within a year I was involved with the postal unions and continued until my retirement in 2003 at age 60 due to my arthritis.

Retirement has been much better than advertised. I started volunteering at places that interested me and served on most of their boards: The Arkansas Air Museum, The National Cemetery folks, the Fayetteville Library, etc.

It's been a good life and Frontier was a huge part of it.

FRONTIER HISTORY

For many years north and south transportation throughout the Rocky Mountain Area has been a matter of grave concern to the travelling public, as well as public officials. While there was a great deal of complaining, little was done to improve the situation until a few men who had vision and faith in the future of the great Rocky Mountain Region conceived the idea of establishing north-south air service.

Ray Wilson, one of aviation's pioneers and nationally known figure in aviation circles, applied to the Civil Aeronautics Board for permission to operate an airline on a scheduled basis in Colorado and New Mexico, with main terminals in Denver, Salt Lake City and Albuquerque. At the same time, another one of the West's pioneer airmen was visualizing the same type service for Wyoming, with its main terminals in Denver, Salt Lake City and Billings. This man was the late Charles Hirsig, II. On March 28, 1946, Ray Wilson, Inc., was granted permission to operate air mail route 73, and on that same day Charles Hirsig was granted permission to operate air mail route 74.

On June 25, 1946, Ray Wilson, Inc, was changed to Monarch Air Lines, and on February 7, 1947, Summit Airways of Mr. Hirsig's company was changed to Challenger Airlines. These two companies operated as Monarch and Challenger airlines, respectively and independently, until the consolidation of the two companies on June 1, 1950, when the merged organizations became Frontier Airlines.

The first actual operation started on November 27, 1946, with one round trip a day between Denver and Durango, a total of some 600 daily miles. Service between Albuquerque and Salt Lake City was inaugurated on January 17, 1947, with one round trip daily. On February 1, 1947, the second Denver-Durango round trip was added, and on March 15, 1947, the second round trip between Salt Lake City and Albuquerque was put into service

On May 3, 1947, service between Denver and Salt Lake City, through Wyoming points, was started and was followed on June 10, 1947, with the inauguration of Billings-Salt Lake City service. On August 15, 1947, service between Denver and Grand junction was inaugurated.

On February 10, 1947, Mr. H. S. Darr, now Frontier's President, assumed financial control of Monarch Air Lines. On March 2, 1947, Challenger Airlines was reorganized and Mr. D. A. Duff, a veteran airline executive, became president. From this time until the merger, both companies continued to show considerable progress in operating technics and in revenue.

February 15, 1949, service to Casper, Wyoming, was inaugurated, and on August 1, 1949, service to Vernal was started. The two companies continued their program of orderly development, and in the early part of 1950, were granted permission to purchase Arizona Airways, which had never actually started operation. On June 1, 1950, service to points in Arizona was integrated into the services of the two other predecessor companies and the entire airline became known as Frontier Airlines. Frontier has grown from an airline of 600 daily scheduled miles to its present size now flying 12,763 daily scheduled miles.

DISPATCH

Each time a Frontier plane takes off, flies or lands, a dispatcher is monitoring its position. 45 employees—serving as dispatch coordinators, dispatchers, assistant dispatchers and dispatch aids—follow carefully planned procedures for each Frontier flight. They are based at the General Office in Denver.

When weather at the airports on Frontier's system is clear, the dispatch system proceeds on a well planned schedule. When weather turns bad, the employees put in extra effort to operate flights efficiently and on time.

When "working' a flight, dispatch will:

- Study weather conditions at each airport included in the flight's itinerary. When working a Denver-Reno-Stockton flight, for example, the dispatcher studies weather and runway conditions at the three airports, plus enroute weather conditions.
- Study the flight's passenger load, noting the number of originating, terminating and connecting passengers.
- Place all available information on the flight's worksheet.
- Request a computerized flight plan for the crew.
- After collecting all-available information, "release" the flight for scheduled departure in accordance with Federal Air Regulations, unless the status of weather or aircraft maintenance changes. This should be done one hour before departure.

Flight crews check in at the airport one hour before departure to check the dispatch release, contacting the dispatcher to discuss any questions. Once these have been resolved, the captain signs the release form, indicating he agrees the flight may be operated safely. Frontier requires the captain and dispatcher to agree on flight departure; if they disagree, the flight will not take off, until agreement is reached.

While the plane is at the gate, maintenance personel will contact dispatch if a mechanical problem will delay departure. Maintenance indicates the time needed to alter the problem, and dispatch adjusts the departure schedule.

If the mechanical problem can't be solved in a reasonable length of time, the dispatch coordinator studies the options of using another airplane, if one is available, or cancelling the flight.

Once the flight departs, the dispatcher monitors the flight progress and watches the weather conditions along the route, amending the flight release if necessary. All available information on the flight is transmitted to reservations agents, ticket counter agents, customer service representatives and station agents through the central computer system.

During bad weather, when flights arrive and depart off schedule, dispatch must adjust the routine. Fast decisions are required. When weather is bad early in the day, for example, the dispatch coordinator may decide to operate as close to schedule as possible or cancel morning flights in order to position aircraft for flights later in the day. The coordinator, ranking member of the dispatch staff, considers what action will benefit the largest number of passengers. When deciding if a flight should be delayed to accommodate "connecting" passengers from other flights, the coordinator studies the passenger loads to determine the number of travelers affected.

Additional responsibilities of dispatch include fuel management, a top priority in light of the high cost of jet fuel. With each flight, dispatchers may decide to carry less expensive fuel from one station to another for later use, rather than pay a higher price for the fuel at the other station. The dispatcher compares the cost of carrying the fuel to the higher price.

These many duties require experienced personnel. By 1982, eight members of the dispatch staff will have 35 years experience in the airline industry. Several others will have totaled 25 years experience. This seasoned approach helps Frontier's fleet operate efficiently, on clear days, and stormy ones.

THE LOVE OF FLYING

by Frontier pilot Bob Williams

It was around this time, while I twelve years old that I started learning about my love for flying. I had my very first ride in an airplane with my Uncle Dick Gourley. He and my father (Lee Gourley) owned a single engine Aircoupe that they kept at the Provo airport, so one day my Uncle Dick decided to take me for a ride. I was so scared that I put both of my arms under the seat belt for the entire flight, so I wouldn't fall out.

When I moved to Salt Lake I discovered that by riding the public bus and transferring downtown I could go all the way to the Salt Lake Airport, so almost every Saturday I would leave early and spent most of the day at the airport. It wasn't like it is today, with the tight security. I could walk anywhere and sit in almost any airplane that was parked and left empty. I can still remember the sights, smells and excitement as I would spend my days looking for adventure or seeing if I could find somebody who would take me for a ride in their airplane.

I would spend most of my time around Thompson Flying Service, owned by Carl and Bea Hellberg. Everyone there sort of adopted me and I soon learned the names of everyone from the office secretary (Jane Andreson) to the airplane mechanics (Norm Moore). I would crawl into any airplane that was left unlocked to spend hours feeling the controls and studying every instrument. My lunch would always be the same. I would buy a hamburger and fries from the terminal café (to go) and then I would buy a grape (Nehi) drink from the pop machine at Thompson Flying Service and then search for an airplane to sit in the pilot's seat while I enjoyed my favorite lunch. This was surely heaven to a 12-year-old "airport bum."

One of my (adult) friends at the airport was a woman who was the secretary for the FAA and she had taken me flying more than once. After one of our flights she asked me when I was going to start taking lessons. To this point I hadn't dreamed that I could start learning how to fly at the age of 13 years old, but it soon became an obsession. I quickly became a paperboy and started delivering the newspaper every morning, so I could afford to take two 30-min lessons per month. My first flying lesson was in a Cessna 140 (tail dragger) rented from Thompson's Flying Service. I had to get there early, for my lesson, so I could find enough seat cushions, so I could sit high enough to see over the instrument panel and far enough forward to reach the rudder

pedals. My first flight instructor was James (Jim) Green who was very patient and understanding of my love for flying. I don't remember anything about that first lesson other than it seemed like a dream that I was afraid I would awake from.

Well the day finally came, several years later, when I turned the legal age of 16 years old, which was the minimum age to solo an aircraft and fly by myself. My stepfather, Bill had given me the choice of either getting my driver's license, or doing my first solo. I choose to solo, so on May 6, 1955 in a yellow Cessna 140 N72575 I became a pilot. It was a beautiful warm Spring day when my instructor (James F. Green) climbed out of the aircraft and told me to take it around the pattern a couple of times by myself. I taxied out for takeoff and following the run up of the engine my legs started shaking so bad I had to sit for about ten minutes trying to decide if it was such a good idea. After mustering up my courage I called the tower and told them I was ready. The Cessna 140 lifted off earlier than normal, because of the less weight with my instructor's seat being vacant. My first landing floated farther down the runway, but was acceptable. That day was to change my life, because I was hooked forever on flying.

At the age of 16 years old I went to work for Thompson Flying Service as a gas boy on the flight line. I made \$1.00 per hour gassing airplanes and working around airplanes. This was heaven! I rarely had much money left in my paycheck after they deducted my use of their planes to build my flying time, but it didn't matter. I was a true "airport bum." I spent all of my time at the Salt Lake airport and I would go flying with anyone, just for the ride. While I was building up my solo hours I would take some of my friends

flying with me, even though it was illegal, because I wasn't licensed to carry passengers.

Finally, after I turned 17 years old I passed my FAA written and on June 11, 1956 I passed my Private Pilot flight test and now it was legal for me to take passengers.

I joined the Civil Air Patrol at this time because they had a Piper Super Cub airplane that I could fly inexpensively and when there was a downed aircraft I could fly for free. I spent many hours all over the state of Utah



zooming just above the trees and flying down sheer wall canyon's looking for lost aircraft. I learned a very important lesson during one of these searches. I had just finished my mission looking for a downed Piper Tri-pacer, when the airplane was found on the side of a mountain southwest of St.George, Utah. I went out with the ground party to see if there were any survivors. We climbed the snow-covered mountain to find the wreckage and the pilot (Paul Noble) frozen in his seat about 300 ft from the top of the mountain. He had flown in bad weather up a box canyon and was trying to turn around when he flew into a "granite" cloud. As we carried his body off the mountain, still frozen in the sitting position, I realized these flying machines could kill you, if you make a mistake.

At eighteen, the minimum FAA age limit, I passed my Commercial License and now I could legally get paid for flying. Much to my distress no one wanted to pay meyet.
