ployees in local service airlines . . . that there are 134,682 in the trunk carriers, Pan Am and Pan Am-Grace Airway . . . and 6,496 in cargo, helicopter, and territorial airlines . . . a grand total of 149,721 employees in the U. S. Schedule airline industry . . . located around the world.

... that back in 1928 it was 1,500 ... then 13,300 in 1938 ... 85,000 in 1948 ... and 135,000 in 1956.

. . . that the annual industry payroll is \$827,436,506. Salaries, employee welfare insurance and other benefits account for 46.1 per cent of total operating costs of the trunklines.

... that the average airline salary is \$5,474 ... as against \$5,081 in railroads ... \$5,166 in highways ... \$5,158 in waterway, pipeline, etc. ... \$5,032—all transportation ... and \$4,021 in all industry.

the things and services they must buy to operate has risen 45 per cent. For example, fuel prices have risen 41 per cent, maintenance materials 44 per cent and average salary 78 per cent.

The scheduled airline industry's commitment for new flight and group equipment amounts to a capital investment over the next few years of more than 18,000 per employee. This compares to \$7,190 investment per employee in the chemical industry for the same period, or \$5,300 in the iron and steel industry. And it is five times greater than the railroad industry's investment of \$3,430 per employee.
