Warren was born to Parents Elizabeth and Albert Heckman in December, 1920. He grew up on a farm in Nebraska, and later in Colorado, with two brothers and two sisters.



Warren played multiple sports in high school and had an opportunity to join the Detroit Tigers baseball team. He joined the marines and was stationed on the USS Saratoga before being sent home to help the family. He then developed a passion for aviation and learned to fly. This allowed him to be a

flight instructor for the US Army Air Corps during World War II.

After the war, Warren became a commercial airline pilot, flying for Frontier Airlines out of Denver, CO. He started with propeller based planes, like the DC-3, and transitioned to the jet age, flying the Boeing 727 and 737.



After retiring as an airline captain, he became a flight instructor for American Airlines in Fort Worth, TX. Later he moved to Phoenix to instruct for America West Airlines. He taught pilots to fly the DC-10 and Boeing 757.



Family has always been important to Warren. He has four children from his first marriage—

Ron, Bill, Betty, and Carol. Warren married Barbara Bos-

tick, a stewardess for Frontier, in 1960. They were married for 56 years. Their two sons are Beau and Judd.

Warren became interested in the Truth when he met Barbara, who was a witness. He studied the Bible with a brother and quickly made the Truth his own. He was baptized in 1959. He severed as an elder for over 40 years and engaged in the ministry as regularly as clockwork. He was always known for being friendly, approachable, and jovial, loving to joke and smile.
